The Perfect Example

Alice in Wonderland is a fascinating little book that sparks imagination. Alice asked the Cheshire cat, "Would you tell me please, which way I ought to go from here?" "That depends a good deal on where you want to get to," said the cat. "I don't much care where," said Alice. "Then it doesn't matter which way you go," said the cat. Not having or knowing one's purpose in life is unfortunate. Richard Leider, a noted life coach, said, "The purpose of life is to have a purpose."

The greatest example of one who fully accomplished His purpose is Jesus Christ, "For I have come down from heaven, not to do My own will, but the will of Him who sent Me" (John 6:38). Jesus knew the reason He came to earth in human form. His purpose was to do the Father's will, and in doing so, His mission was accomplished.
