Making the Best Use of Time

Are we doing what we were created for? Are we "making the best use of the time"?

t is said, "Time is the stuff of which life is made." Since that seems true, using time for Christ is how we give Him our lives. Scripture, therefore, says, "Look carefully then how you walk, not as unwise but as wise, making the best use of the time, because the days are evil" (Ephesians 5:15-16 ESV).

This is being written on March 21, 2020. Because of the coronavirus pandemic, most of us are in our houses under "self-quarantine." Most meetings or gatherings, including church assemblies, have been temporarily called off; restaurants are closed except for takeout; people are urged to stay at home. There seems to be more discretionary time than usual to "make the best use of." How many of us have even given thought to use the extra "free time" imposed on us?

If time is really the "stuff of which life is made," then "killing time is suicide."

Here are some ways we can "redeem the time" (KJV):

- l. Write to parents, grandparents, or grandchildren. Intentionally keep relationships that will enable us to encourage faithfulness to God and His church. The faith must be handed from generation to generation. "I have chosen him [Abraham], that he may command his children and his household after him to keep the way of the LORD by doing righteousness and justice" (Genesis 18:19 ESV).
- 2. Use the time to enhance your own relationship with God. Read Scripture. Pray. Pick out a book of the Bible to learn thoroughly. Read it through several times in more than one translation. Reduce the

message of the book to one sentence. Learn to go through the book chapter by chapter. When you have mastered one, do the same with another.

3. Think of someone you wish we converted to Christ. Pray for this person by name. Ask if he or she would have a Bible study with you. If yes, set a time and place, and begin. Several good studies are prepared for that purpose. If you know of one you like, use it. Personally, I like to study Mark and Acts: Mark because it is about Jesus and Acts because it presents model cases of conversion. Keep the focus on Jesus, His attractive character, and His resurrection.

Early on, find out whether the person believes the Bible is the Word of God and whether he or she would go to heaven if Christ were to come tonight. If this person does not believe the Bible, go on with the study. The Bible message is often self-authenticating, but watch for hang-ups that need answers. If he or she believes in already being saved, ask to describe how that occurred and write down the answer. This is too early, however, to rebut the answer. Let the study do that.

4. Think of good works you can do to help people and do them. Do them anonymously, if possible. As Christians, when we were made new creatures, we were "created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them" (Ephesians 2:10).

Are we doing what we were created for? Are we "making the best use of the time"?
