Plus personally brother Highers was the first preacher I remember hearing as a child. He had a profound influence on my early years as a Christian. I know brother and sister Highers would appreciate your prayers as they battle health issues. The post is very interesting and good reading, it will increase your respect for this man and his lovely wife.

AT HOME.

It has been said that "home" is the sweetest word in the English language. I do not know if this is accurate or not, but I know there is a pleasant and peaceful sensation about being in that place we call home. After spending five days in the hospital, including three days in ICU, I am happy to be home. I am not speaking merely of the "house" where we live, although that is part of it, but I am thinking of family, loved ones, friends, brothers and sisters in Christ, and everything that creates the relationship that we call "home."

I have been poked, pierced, prodded, stuck with needles, given blood, deprived of food and water, and awakened at 2:00 and 3:00 in the morning, but it is something we endure because we know people are trying to be helpful and to nurse us back to health. I will turn 85 on my next birthday, which seems impossible, as I remember being a student a "few" years ago at Freed-Hardeman where I met a lovely bride who is still by my side after almost 65 years. We married on August 2, 1957, in Jackson, Mississippi. We moved back to Henderson in July 1984 and have lived here ever since. The people of Chester County have been good to us. My wife taught at the high school and the people of Chester County have elected her to the County Commission multiple times where she has served with dedication and honor. She was instrumental in bringing the Tech School to Chester County, and she has rarely missed a meeting in all the years she has served. I hope the county may see fit to name something after her at some future date.

I served as a Circuit Judge in Memphis, Shelby County, until then-Governor Lamar Alexander appointed me to the state Court of Appeals, meeting at Jackson, where I served from 1982 to my retirement in 2014. For the last seven years of my term, I was the Presiding Judge of the Western Section. At the time of my retirement, I was the senior appellate judge in the entire State of Tennessee. I served as president of the Tennessee Judicial Conference in 1984-85. My name is inscribed in the Supreme Court Buildings in Jackson, Nashville, and Knoxville. My portrait hangs in the Shelby County Courthouse in Memphis in Division 1 of the Circuit Court where I once served. I always received high ratings from the Bar Association in Memphis (above 90%). I endeavored to treat lawyers and litigants with courtesy and respect.

My recent illness and hospital stay reminded me of the fragility of life. The Book of James tells us life is like a vapor that arises for a little while and then vanishes away. No matter what we accomplish in life, there is a vast eternity that looms before us. I consider that the most important work in my life has been as a Bible teacher and proclaimer of the gospel. I conducted the Open Forum at the annual Freed-Hardeman Bible Lectureship for fifteen years. For over thirty years I have been editor of the Spiritual Sword journal. I am grateful for every friendship I have established across the years—in the church, in education, in the state judiciary, and wherever I have served.
